



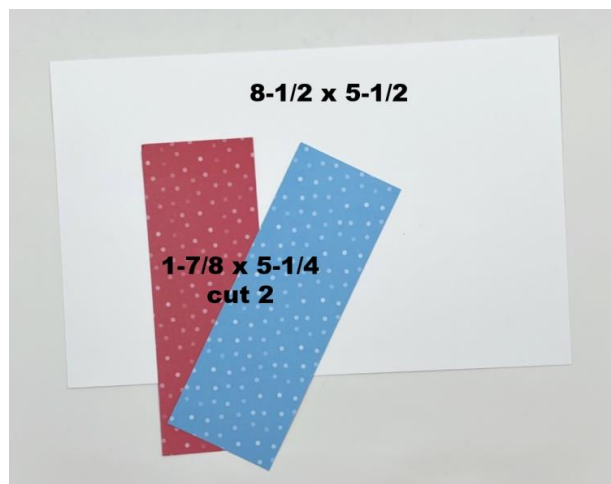

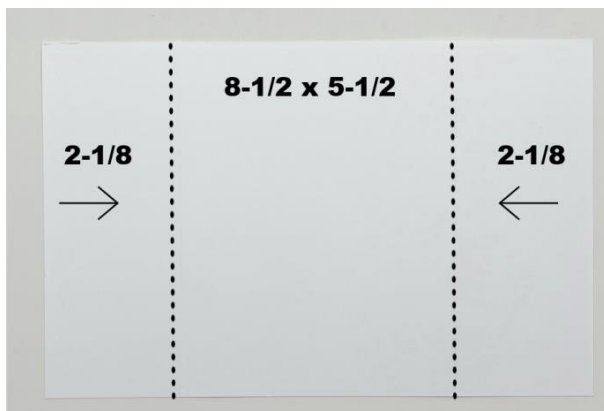
Basic Gatefold Card

What makes a gatefold card a gatefold is that the sides fold in so that the card opens like a gate.

To make a basic gatefold card this is all you need:



Score the base card at 2-1/8" in from each side. Fold.



Add the Designer Series Paper strips to the card front.



*If you want to add a second layer, cut two pieces of cardstock at 1-7/8" x 5-1/4" and layer on top two pieces of Designer Series Paper cut at 1-3/4" x 5-1/8".



Latch Gatefold Cards Version 1

Adding a latch means adding a little something to keep the card closed. Punches always work, but also look at the different pieces in your dies to see what else you can use.

1. Add your accent piece to the left panel first.
2. Use dimensionals on the latch piece, making sure to not put them under the part that will hold the tucked under pieces.

*If your latch is made from Designer Series Paper or lightweight white cardstock, it helps to glue that piece on piece of scrap white cardstock and cut that out. It will add strength.



This fat cat card uses two punches for the latch.



The little cloud used as the latch on the turtle card is cut right from the same paper.



Dimensionals were placed on the top and bottom of the plant on this card so the sentiment accent slides in the middle.

On this flower card, the red flower on the right is the latch piece. There are dimensionals under this piece so the other flowers can be tucked under.



Now, let's rotate this card and get a totally new look.

The measurements and directions all stay the same!



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Now let's change it one more time!

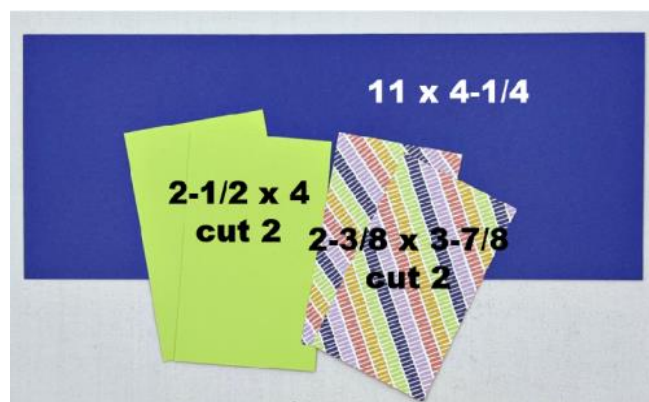
Latch Gatefold Cards Version 2

Again, it's the same basic card, except that this one uses a 4-1/4" x 11" piece of cardstock for the base card. Score at 2-3/4" on each side and fold to the middle.

Add the Designer Series Paper.
